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ICC Board of Trustees Chair's Report

ICC – A Means to Enrich our Lives

The Asian Indian community in Rochester has every right to take pride in the fact that it established one of the first secular community centers in the country. The India Community Center of Rochester is the rock on which many other organizations, such as Hindu Heritage Summer Camp, Sadhu Vaswani Summer Camp, Nevaeh Summer Camp, Kalidas, Rochester Yoga Retreat, have grown. While these organizations need the ICC for conducting their businesses, the dependence is mutual. These provide more than 80% of ICC's operating income. The income from Indian social functions (of individuals and regional groups) currently accounts for only about 10% of ICC's rental income.

ICC was never meant to be an end in itself. **It is the means to accomplish greater objectives to enrich our lives.** In addition to providing a home to the above programs, the ICC has, for many years, organized classical music and dance concerts, Diwali function, Annual Banquet, New Year's Eve Party, Sleepless at ICC etc. This year, we will improve upon the existing programs and also add some new ones.

1. New Year's Eve party will be free for Members.
2. Mother's Day Brunch – A new program to be started this year. The admission for this event will be free for mothers (ICC Members only).
3. Educational Lecture Series: 2-3 lectures will be arranged each year. The topics will be of relevance to the Indian community. Guest speakers will be invited from Continental USA and Canada.
4. Charitable Activities – The ICC will sponsor a tutorial center in the City of Rochester. The goal is to help 50-60 children from the inner city with after school tutoring. In my estimation, it will cost about \$10,000 a year to accomplish this objective. (Members of the community, who wish to contribute to this project, are requested to send the donations to ICC). I am glad to report that in response to my request in an earlier letter, 7 members of our community have volunteered to do tutoring in Math and Science subjects. More volunteers are needed.
5. Popular Music Concerts – I invite a volunteer to lead this activity. I would like this Committee to function in a similar fashion as the Classical Music and Dance Committee.

The main building at the ICC is now 30 years old, and needs a new siding and a new roof. This project will cost about \$100,000, and we aim to complete it by June, 2007. More information on this project is available on page 4. We request you to contribute generously to this project so that we can avoid borrowing. Please send your contributions, payable to ICC, to my address (15 Bretton Woods Dr, Rochester, NY 14618).

I invite you all to help the Board of Trustees to make the ICC a better and more exciting institution.

B. V. Jagadeesh
Chief Guest and Keynote Speaker
ICC Annual Banquet March 31, 2007

B.V. Jagadeesh is an Entrepreneur, a Philanthropist and a Venture Capitalist. He is a Venture Advisor with Gabriel Venture partners assisting with deal sourcing, due diligence and value-add. He was Group Vice President and General Manager of Citrix Systems' Application Networking Group and currently serving in an advisory role transitioning before embarking his next project.. He joined Netscaler as CEO in 2000 while serving as a Venture Partner for Gabriel, in order to take a more active role in managing the investment. Netscaler grew to become the market leader in



Application Delivery Systems and was acquired by Citrix for \$325M in 2005. Jagadeesh and his team worked very hard to make the acquisition a huge success by achieving revenues of > \$100M in 2006. Prior to Netscaler, Jagadeesh co-founded Exodus Communications in 1994, which achieved an IPO and became the leader in the Internet Web co-location business for mission-critical Internet applications. Exodus was sold to Cable and Wireless in 2002 and eventually acquired by Savvis communications. He helped attract venture funding for NexPrise, which offers next-generation Extranet solutions for businesses, and co-founded VPNET Technologies in 1995, a pioneer in virtual private networking technologies acquired by Avaya. Jagadeesh led strategic product design for 3Com and Novell, and was the chairman of Networld + Interop's 1994 and 1995 Engineer's Conference held in Las Vegas. He served as a director of Arula Systems (merged with Raritan, expected to IPO), FireEye, Edurite and NetMagic Solutions (both in India). He received his Master's degree in Computer Science Engineering from the University of Bombay, India and his Bachelor's degree in Electrical Engineering from the Bangalore University, India.

Jagadeesh shot into limelight in December 1999 and became a household name after his surprise donation of \$1 million to improve educational standards in BCC Schools which is a neglected sector and till his gesture, there had been no such massive infusion of

money. A brief glimpse into Jagadeesh's background will indicate the reason for this gesture. From a small village near Bagalur, 30 km from Bangalore, his education was mostly in middle class institutions: Schooling from Seshadripuram High School, pre-university in National College, engineering degree from UVCE and Masters from VJTI, Mumbai.

"When we started Exodus, people laughed at us that we were taking on the job of the telephone networks. But we had strong belief in our idea and thanks to our venture capitalist, who also believed in our concept, we managed to take off". While at NetScaler, Jagadeesh managed to build a successful company especially going through the rocky period of 2001-2003. NetScaler today sits in front of some of the most well known and complex sites, such as Google, Amazon, E-Bay, CricInfo, Yahoo, Apple and over thousand other customers.

Despite the cynics, where did the success come from? Jagadeesh's explanation is very simple. "In a big company, getting relevant decision makers together can take weeks. Clients look for smaller companies with smaller organizational set up, which can deliver. In Silicon Valley, reputation or size does not matter. Delivery does. And that's where we have been successful."

Jagadeesh believes that it is most important to give back to those sectors which helped him to rise, and hence his donation to Bangalore schools. He is also involved in many there initiatives such as India Literacy Project, One School At A Time (OSAAT) Sankara Eye Foundation, most all of them related to education and enhancement of quality of life. "I am also initiating entrepreneurial awards in several universities across India to promote early creative and entrepreneurial activity". But that's not all. He also believes in helping budding entrepreneurs like he was helped once. "Currently, I am involved with angel investing and mentoring in several companies both in US and in India. I have invested in several venture capital firms in India to primarily initiate venture capital activities similar to that in US/Silicon Valley."

In his keynote address, Jagadeesh will be talking about the Challenges and Opportunities of Globalization in India He will address the social and economic impact on the lives of people and how India will be able to handle the challenges and turn that into opportunities.

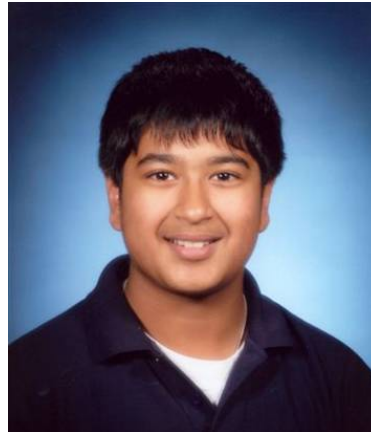

Dr. Shashi Sharma's Welcome Address

Dear Family,

A very warm welcome to you as we celebrate the 3rd anniversary of SAATHI. I chose to address you as family as you have come here to support the cause of SAATHI that is very dear to my heart. Our South-Asian culture emphasizes women to be tolerant and to suffer in silence, abuse and assault is considered a personal family secret that should not leak out and bring shame to the family. Endurance and tolerance of abuse is

advised over and over again. SAATHI has 24x7 phone line, email and website to have victims learn about DV and connect with SAATHI advocates who have patience to hear and a trained mind to help the DV/SA victims. SAATHI is also a member of DVC (Domestic Violence Consortium) and is thus able to connect with various resources in the community. SAATHI board members continue to take training in DV and SA and to increase community awareness. SAATHI holds 2 educational seminars annually in spring and fall. A SAATHI board member has completed the training to be an immigration advocate and SAATHI has applied for accreditation by BIA (Board of Immigration Appeals). All required forms are completed by SAATHI advocate and fees are paid by SAATHI on behalf of victims. All your tax deductible donations to SAATHI go towards helping DV/SA victims and for educating the community. SAATHI is a 501 (3) C organization, has no paid staff or office. All SAATHI board members and friends volunteer their time and monetary support for the clients. SAATHI appreciates your generous support and sincerely thanks each and every one of you here tonight and others who supported but could not attend. All the best till we see you next year.



A Survivor's Story

I am a *Survivor* and have rebuilt my life and can attest to the fact that there is a better life to look forward to. I address this to all those of you who have helped me or other survivors like me. If you are in any capacity to help a victim of domestic violence, whether you be an attorney, a Judge, a doctor, a counselor, a teacher, a parent, a sister, a brother, an aunt, an uncle, a cousin, or simply a friend -- please help the victim by taking her by the hand and assisting her as she strives to seek safety. If you are in a position of a Judge, then you have the capability of assuring that name-calling, false accusations, threats and threatening stances and looks are not allowed in the courtroom. You have the extreme authority to ensure that the victim of domestic violence is not reduced to a puddle of tears once she leaves your courtroom. To the attorneys, I ask that you try to remember the effect of your words spoken in court, on all around you. It is not simply about trying to get the upper hand in a trial, or a court hearing. It is about a victim who has been battered on some level, and who is seeking safety from the abuse. It is about a life that is crying out for help and aid in finding peace once again. It is about a person who longs to stop being abused. The greatest respect that I have for an attorney that I know is one whom I have seen state only the facts. I have witnessed both sides of this spectrum. I have witnessed my abuser's attorney point fingers at me, cursing and 'glaring' at me, with my advocate at my side. However, I have also witnessed an attorney, who stuck to the facts and didn't play the game that I have seen so often in court between attorneys. She stated only the facts and each time an accusation as made that was false, she was quick to point out the facts..

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Policies and Procedures
ICC SERVICE EXCELLENCE AWARD

Developed by BOT on February 22, 1992

Amended by BOT on February 9, 2005

1. The ICC will give out awards to recognize outstanding service to the center on an annual basis, at the time of its anniversary celebration. It is emphasized that this is an “In-house Recognition’ designed to foster consistency and dedication in volunteerism, specifically to benefit ICC
2. The name of the Award shall be “SERVICE EXCELLENCE AWARD”. This shall be an honorary award and shall carry no monetary value.
3. The number of awards be limited to a maximum of two annually. An additional award may be considered in unusual circumstances during any give year.
4. The criteria for the award shall be based on specific, consistent, honorable and outstanding service to ICC. The recipient may be an individual, a group of individuals, an institution or an organization. The immediate past chairperson who has served the ICC honorably may be considered for one award.
5. The selection process shall be by means of a Nominations Committee of a minimum of five members appointed by the Board of Trustees, one shall be a member of the BOT, who shall chair, the second shall be a past chair of the ICC, and the remaining shall be members of ICC. The Nominations Committee shall be in place no later than 60 days prior to the annual ICC Banquet.
6. Solicitation for nominations shall be well advertised by means of the ICC Newsletter, ICC webpage and ICC bulletin board. Additional methods can be pursued by the Nominations Committee.
7. The “Nominations Form” must be submitted to the Committee by the prescribed deadline. Verbal nominations will not be entertained.
8. Recommendation of candidates by the Nominations Committee shall be made at the regularly scheduled monthly BOT meeting prior to the Banquet.
9. The BOT shall have the right to confirm or deny by a majority vote, the recommendation of the nominations Committee. The BOT shall obtain the candidates’ acceptance after confirmation and before finalizing the awards. If the BOT or the candidate does not accept the nomination(s), the nominating committee shall have an additional week to present alternate candidate(s). The BOT may vote not to give out any award in any given year.
10. The Award shall be in the form of a plaque bearing the insignia of ICC.

India Community Center of Rochester Renovation Project

At the Annual ICC General Body meeting (AGM), a resolution was passed authorizing some major maintenance and renovation of the main building area. A committee was formed soon after this meeting to identify, prioritize, solicit bids and supervise this activity. The committee has identified the following items to be done in priority order

1. Replacing the roof. This involves removing of the current shingles, replacing damaged boards, installing vents and replacing with 30 year architectural shingles
2. Replacing the siding. This involves removal of the current siding, repairing the surface and replacing with maintenance free vinyl siding.
3. Replacing the 15 remaining north facing windows with single pane fixed windows.

4. Fixing the upper entrance step and installing a wheelchair accessible ramp with railings
5. Installing 6x6 guard posts along the driveway on the East side between the lower and upper parking lot to prevent cars from going down the slope in icy conditions

The committee has contacted a few contractors and is working to get multiple bids for these jobs. The estimated cost at this point is roughly \$100,000. The goal is to complete the activity by June 2007. A fund raising activity will be initiated to raise funds for these much needed repairs and upgrades. Please feel free to provide your input and suggestions to anyone on the committee.

The committee consists of Surendar Jeyadev, Amit Trivedi, Padmanabh Kamath and Aanand Parthasarathi.
